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DASA LIAISON SPOTLIGHT: DR. BARRY OLSON

energy to the program to support our faculty and students. Dr. Olson has supervised, mentored, and taught higher education students since he arrived at NC State. Dr. Olson is a tireless advocate for the higher education program. Many would easily describe Dr. Olson with these positive attributes, yet the accomplishments in his career, his present involvements, and future aspirations are truly what make Dr. Olson special.

Barry received his Ed.D from the program in 2010, where his dissertation explored difficult dialogues of white male graduate students within student affairs preparation programs make meaning of their whiteness, overall white privilege, and multiculturalism.

Dr. Olson has been with N.C. State University for over ten years. He has worked numerous aspects of the university; some of these areas include University Housing with the Quad and E.S. King apartments, the Associate Director of

Housing Facilities, and the Director of Business Administration for Campus Life. Barry was recently named the Associate Vice Provost for Business Administration for the Division of Academic and Student Affairs (DASA), where he oversees the overall budget and administrative aspect for division.

Dr. Olson has stayed involved with the program since completing his degree. He is an adjunct faculty member in the College of Education and has been asked as a guest lecture for numerous courses. Additionally, he frequently facilitates trainings across the university for various student, faculty, staff, and other sub-groups.

His active involvement expands beyond N.C. State. He was the 2006 President of North Carolina Housing Officers (NCHO), and he regularly attends and presents at the Southeastern Association of Housing Officers (SEAHO); the Association of College and University Housing Officers – International (ACUHO-I); and the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA) – just to name a few.

A LinkedIn recommendation from one of Dr. Olson's colleagues sums it up best: Dr. Barry Olson is "very helpful and knowledgeable about current issues in Higher Education... [he would be] a great addition to anyone's staff because he is a hard worker and a team player."

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2014 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNA: DR. SHARON E. MORRISSEY

It is with great excitement that the NCSU College of Education has selected Dr. Sharon E. Morrissey as this year's recipient of the Higher Education Distinguished Alumni Award. Dr. Morrissey earned her doctorate in Higher Education Administration in 2003 and currently serves as the Executive Vice President for Programs and Chief Academic Officer for the North Carolina Community College System. Upon announcement of the award, faculty member Audrey Jaeger remarked, "I am honored to work with such an articulate, intelligent, and thoughtful human being. Sharon is someone I admire and emulate. She represents the best of what we do at NC State." In her current role, Dr. Morrissey initiates, develops and administers state -level policies and strategies to improve student access, enhance program quality, and increase student success. She is responsible for the statelevel coordination of literacy and foundational skills education, academic programs, student success policies, federal basic skills and technical education grants, research and performance management, workforce training and continuing education, and related resource development activities. Dr. Morrissey serves as staff liaison to the North Carolina Community College Presidents' Association and as executive staff member to the State Board of Community Colleges.

Dr. Morrissey leads several system-wide initiatives designed to support student success in the 58 community colleges. She is the state lead for a Developmental Education Initiative designed to accelerate students' completion of remedial coursework and their success in gateway college courses. She also leads the development of system policies to support the Gates Foundation's Completion by Design initiative in NC. In 2011, Dr. Morrissey collaborated with the Governor's office and the Department of Public Instruction to develop the Career and College Promise legislation that streamlines high school student dual enrollment pathways, and she developed policies to allow adult basic skills students to dual enroll in occupational courses leading to credentials.

Dr. Morrissey has over 20 years of experience in the North Carolina Community College System, including President of Richmond Community College, Vice President for Instruction at Asheville-Buncombe Technical Community College, Vice President for Academic and Student Services at Fayetteville Technical Community College, and Associate Vice President for Academic and Student Services at



the NCCCS. She began her community college career as an English instructor at Central Carolina Community College.

Reflecting on her time at NC State, Dr. Morrissey stated, "I would not be in the leadership role I am in today were it not for NC State University. The Higher Ed Administration program provided access for working adults like me, who otherwise would not have been able to pursue a doctoral degree. I was fortunate to be mentored by outstanding faculty members who had conducted significant research in community college leadership. The program's emphasis on practice and research, foundations and history, teaching and learning, and leadership and organizational development prepared me well for institutional leadership roles. Even more, the program provided me with a holistic understanding of higher education institutions and systems that has been particularly beneficial to me in my role as chief academic officer of one of the largest community college systems in the country."

In 2006, NC State named Dr. Morrissey the recipient of the I.E. Ready Distinguished Graduate Award for Leadership Excellence in Adult and Community College Education. This summer Dr. Morrissey will depart North Carolina for Richmond, Virginia where she will serve as the Vice Chancellor for Academic Services and Research for the Virginia Community College System. Reflecting on her long career in North Carolina, faculty member Paul Umbach said, "Sharon Morrissey is a tremendous leader and educator. For years, North Carolina and its community college system have benefitted from her extraordinary talent, commitment, and wisdom. She has touched many lives and her presence in the state will be sorely missed."

After graduation, master's student Nicole Thomas will head to New York City to serve as a site coordinator for Duke University's Moxie Project. The program is managed by DukeEngage, which funds opportunities for undergraduate students to participate in summer immersion service projects. As site coordinator, she will supervise nine undergraduate women as they work with social justice non-profits aimed to promote gender equality in

Manhattan and the U.S. Additionally, she will co-teach a seminar course that critically examines non-profit work and systemic issues faced by these organizations. Along with their service work, students will engage in social and cultural activities throughout the city. Nicole is very excited about the opportunity and is looking forward to gaining knowledge and experience in program administration and course instruction.



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NODA INTERNSHIP: PERSPECTIVE FROM NATALIE ROLLAN, CLASS OF 2015

This summer I will embark on a new journey in my professional career as I travel to Montclair, New Jersey to complete a NODA Internship at Montclair State University. The NODA Internship Program, run through the Association for Orientation, Transition, and Retention in Higher Education, matches host institutions with graduate and undergraduate students looking to expand their orientation experience and connections. The application and selection process was fast-paced and competitive and I am glad to have had yet another experience that will prepare me for my job search next year.

For my internship, I will be working with The Center for Advising and Student Transitions at Montclair with a program focus in Peer Leader Supervision for New Student Orientation. The Orientation Experience at Montclair is led and facilitated by full-time staff members as well as 20 student Peer Leaders, along with three Graduate Interns. As a Graduate Intern I will assist with coordinating New Student Orientation for incoming first-year students and their families. Two other interns and I will aid in the final planning stages of New Student Orientation and in the implementation and execution of all orientation programs.

Each of the Graduate Interns will act as liaisons between the Peer Leaders and professional staff members while assisting with supervision of Peer Leaders. Another portion of my work will entail becoming familiar with Montclair's General Education curriculum as it pertains to first-year students and freshman transfer students and assisting as needed with course registration and selection.

I have been assigned the position of Peer Leader Supervisor, thus I will mainly focus on motivating, engaging, and recognizing these student leaders as well as encouraging teambuilding and personal development through their positions with orientation. In this program area, I will model and facilitate icebreakers and community builders for the Peer Leader staff and support them in the daily functioning of the New Student Orientation programs.

One of the perks of being at Montclair for two months this summer is the city's proximity to some great tourist and travel spots. I'll definitely be visiting New York City, which is about 15 miles away, The Jersey Shore, and maybe even the Hershey Factory in Pennsylvania! I'm excited to live in a new state, never having been to New Jersey before, and explore a new institution and functional area. I'm hoping this internship gives me a clearer idea of the type of institution I'd like to work at in the future, the student population I work best with, and the functional area I'd like to pursue further. I can't wait for this new chapter in my student affairs journey to begin!
